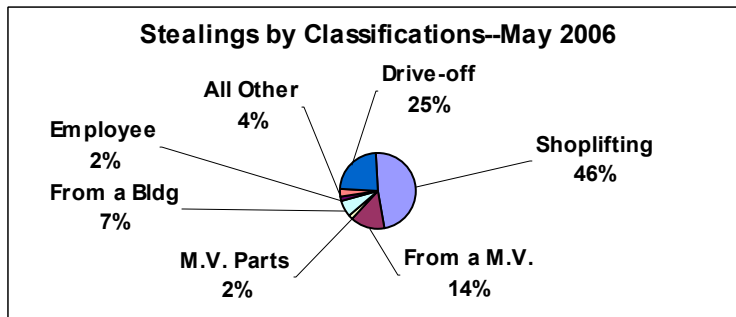
Topic: May 2006 Public Report

This is the report of the activity of the Crestwood Police Department for the month of May 2006. In May 2006, there were 72 Part I offenses and 426 Part II offenses for a total of 498. This compares with 36 Part I offenses and 412 Part II offenses for a total of 448 in May 2006. The main difference was in the number of stealing and property damages.

There were four assaults in May 2006 and three involved domestic violence. In three cases, the parties knew each other prior to the assaults.

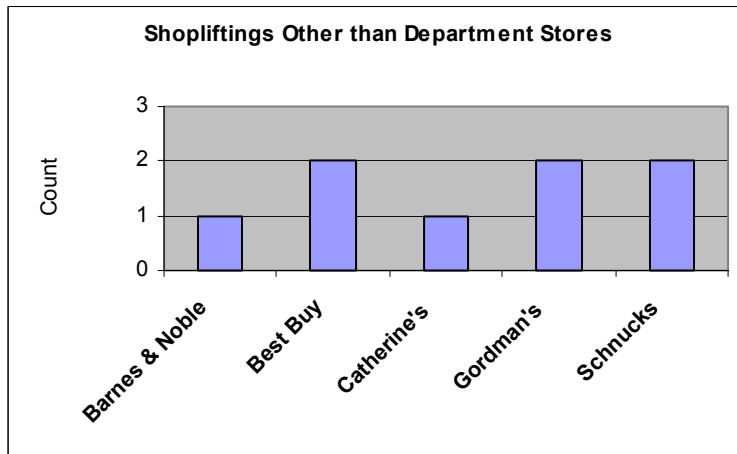
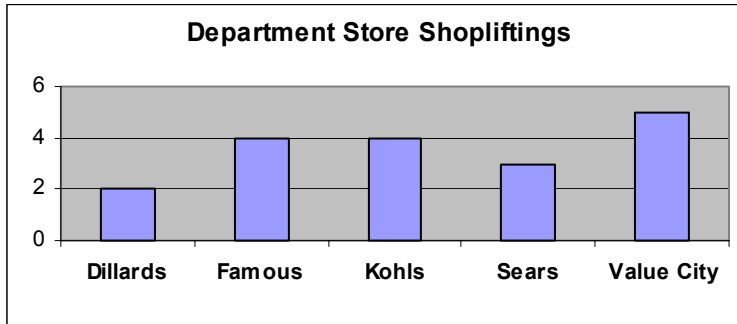
Stealing offenses numbered 57 in May 2006

Stealings were of the following classifications in May 2006:



. The remainder of the stealings involved camera equipment, license plates and license plate tabs, cash, a car stereo and a GPS system from vehicles. A shop vac, hair straightener, cell phone and cash and credit cards were taken from buildings. One employee was involved in a theft from their employer and someone had been taking scrap copper from a heating and cooling company. Fourteen drivers drove-off without paying for gasoline.

Shopliftings accounted for 26 of the 57 stealings in May 2006 or 46%. The shopliftings occurred at the following stores in May 2006:

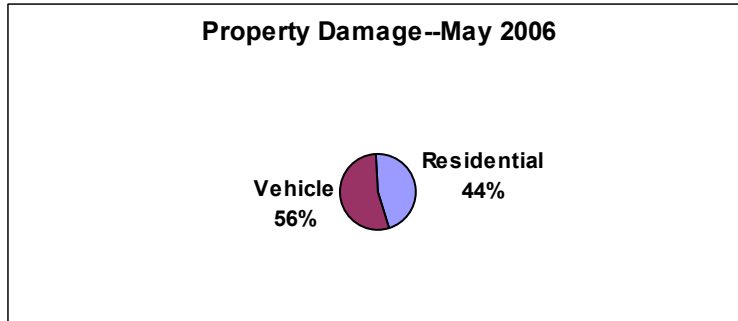


Of the shopliftings, 85% were cleared by arrest and adults accounted for 72%, juveniles accounted for 23% and adults and juveniles accounted for another 5% of the clearances.

The items shoplifted were found to be:



There were nine property damages in May 2006 and involved damage to a mailbox, punctured liner for a pool, broken door to residences and broken windows occurred to vehicles. The property damages were of the following classifications:



There were no receiving stolen properties and one stolen vehicle in May 2006. On 05-31-06, someone stole a black 1993 Ford Aerostar that was parked, with vehicle problems, on the on-ramp to I-44 from Big Bend.

Part I offenses numbered 72 in May 2006.

**Part II:**

In May 2006, there were seven frauds, four credit card frauds, one bad check and two identity thefts. There was one drug possession that involved a small quantity of marijuana. There were four offenses against public peace, two disorderly conducts, one peace disturbance and one annoying phone call. The five people related cases were three sick cases, one accidental injury and one sudden death. Juvenile offenses included one minor in possession and the one family offense was a criminal non-support.

Part II offenses totaled 498 in May 2006.

In May 2006 in Ward One, there were no sexual assaults, robberies or burglaries. Stealings numbered twelve with ten at addresses on Watson Road, one in Watson Industrial and one in the neighborhoods. Property damages numbered one, none at addresses along Watson Road and one in the neighborhoods. There were no stolen vehicles. There was one fraud, one offense against public peace, one family offense and no drug offenses, juvenile or weapons offenses. There were no DWI cases and eight traffic accidents. There were one people related calls and one animal related calls. Suspicious activity calls numbered seventeen and occurred on nine different streets and there were 37 miscellaneous police service calls.

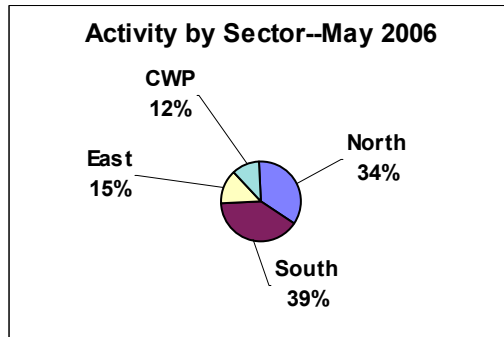
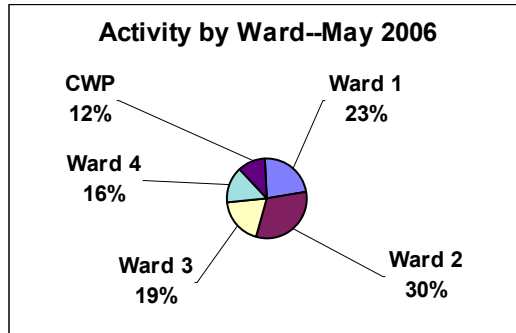
In Ward Two in May 2006, there was one sexual assault and no robberies or burglaries. Stealings numbered twenty-one with twenty at addresses on Watson Road, Watson Plaza and Big Bend and one in the neighborhoods. Property damages numbered four, none at addresses along Watson Road and Big Bend, one on Camera Ave. and three in the neighborhoods. There was one stolen vehicle. There were two frauds, and no drug offenses, offenses against public peace, juvenile, family or weapons offenses. There were no DWI cases and eleven traffic accidents. There were four people related calls and two animal related calls. Suspicious activity calls numbered nine and occurred on seven different streets and there were 42 calls for miscellaneous police services.

In May 2006 in Ward Three, there were no sexual assaults or robberies and an attempt burglary on Pinewood. Stealings numbered eleven with nine at addresses on Watson Road and two in the neighborhoods. There were no property damages or stolen vehicles in May. There was one fraud, one drug offense, one offense against public peace, one juvenile related no family or weapons offenses. There was one DWI case and four traffic accidents. There were no people or animal related calls. Suspicious activity calls numbered twelve and occurred on eight different streets and there were 26 miscellaneous police service calls.

In Ward Four in May 2006, there were no sexual assaults or robberies and one burglary on Harwich. Stealings numbered two and property damages numbered four and there were no stolen vehicles. There were no frauds or drug offenses, one offense against public peace and no juvenile, family or weapons offenses. There were no DWI and no traffic accidents. There were no people related calls and six animal related calls. Suspicious activity calls numbered thirteen and occurred on eight different streets and there were 28 calls for miscellaneous police services.

In Crestwood Plaza, there were no sexual assaults or robberies but there were two burglaries. Stealings numbered eleven with nine shopliftings, one from vehicles and one from buildings. There were no property damages or stolen vehicles. There were three frauds, no drug offenses, and one offense against public peace, no juvenile, family or weapons offenses. There were no DWI cases and six traffic accidents and no people related or animal related calls. Suspicious activity calls numbered five and there were 20 police service calls of a miscellaneous nature.

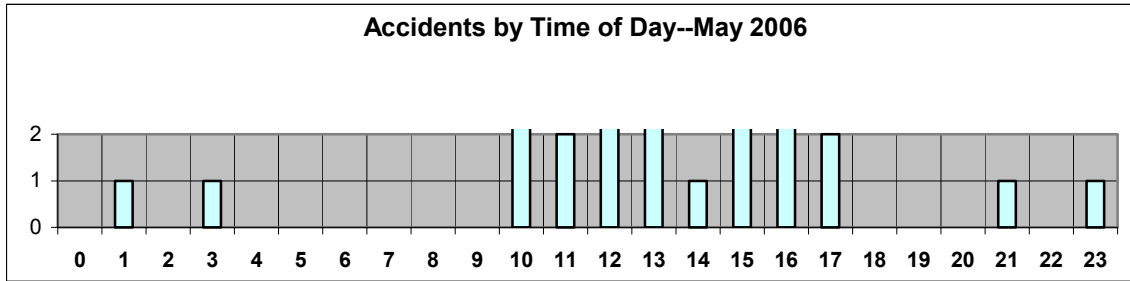

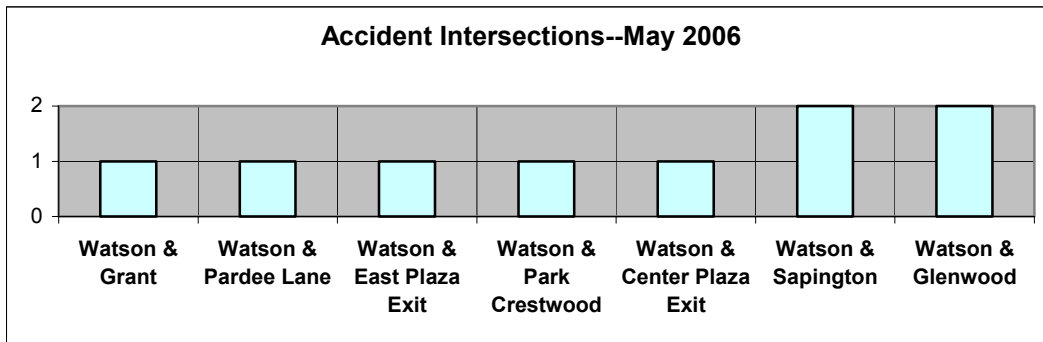
Accidents occurred during the following hours of the day:



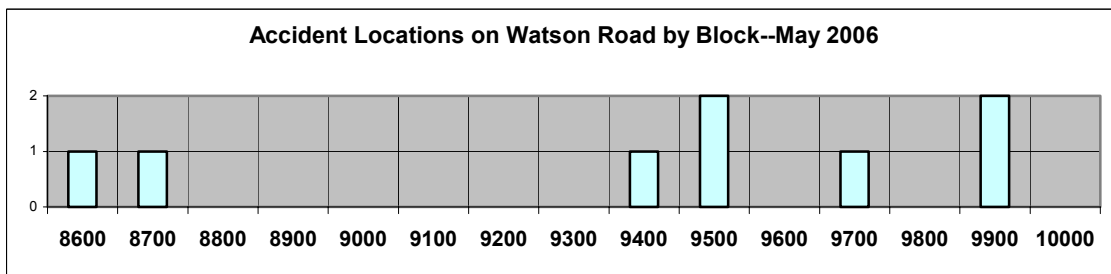
Accidents occurred on the following streets in May 2006:



Accidents occurred at the following intersections:



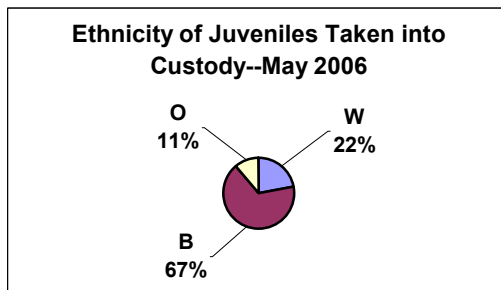
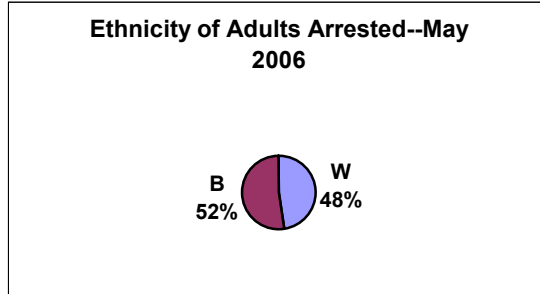

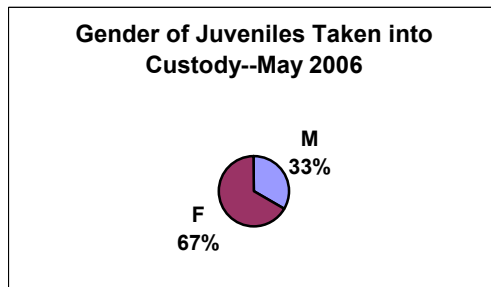
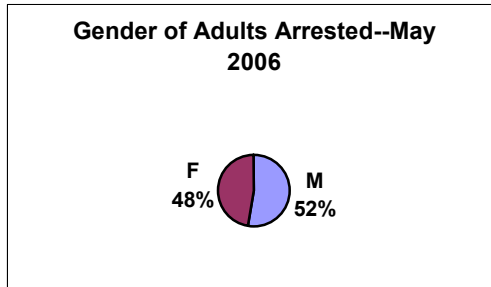
**Arrest Information:**

Eighty-four adults and nine juveniles were taken into custody in May 2006. Twenty-two persons were issued summons in lieu of physical arrests.

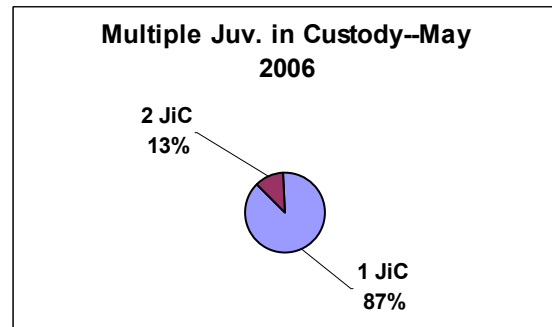
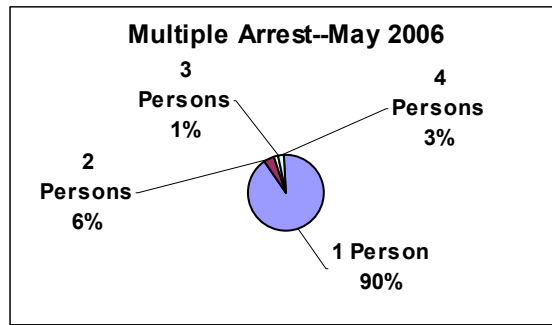
The ethnicity of the person taken into custody was:



The gender of the persons taken into custody was:



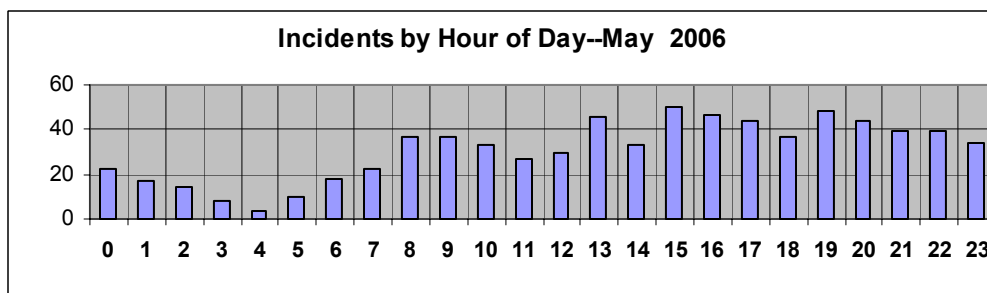
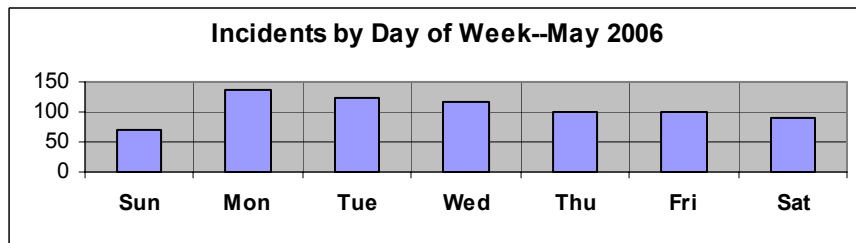
**Multiple Arrests:**



Multiple arrests are tracked due to the manpower and time required to safely transport and process multiple prisoners from the same incident.

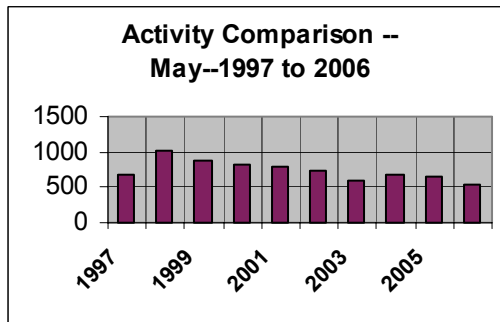
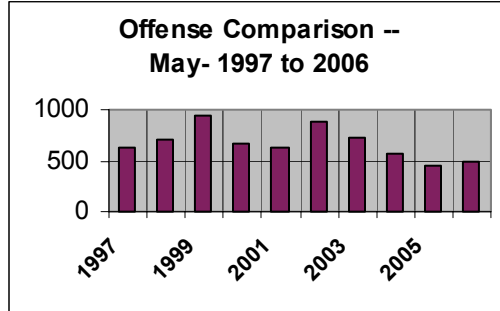

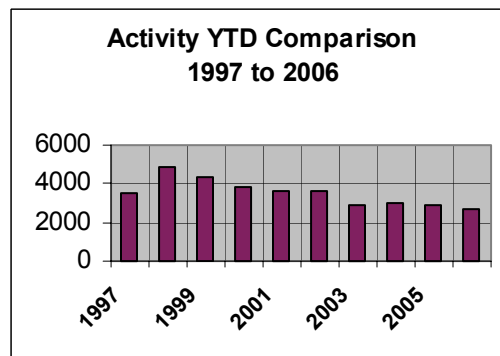
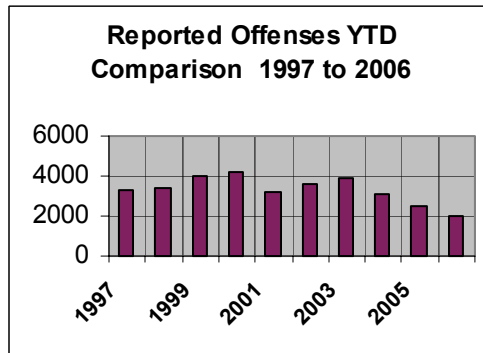


**Offense and Activity Comparison:**

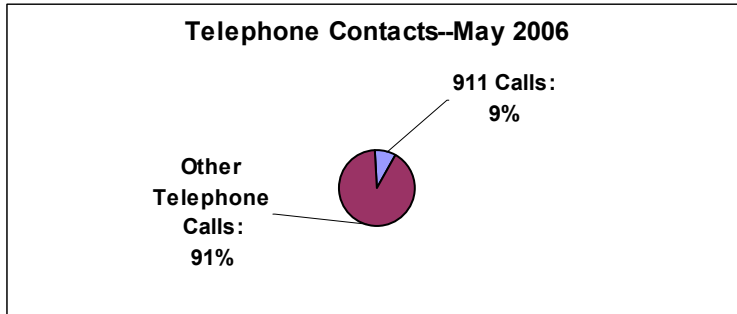


Years to Date:



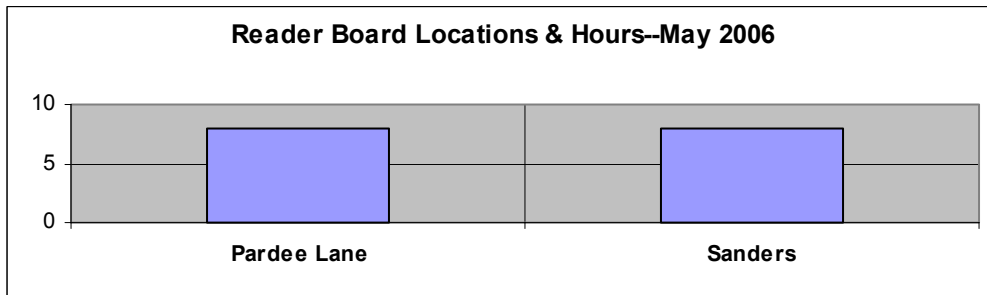
**Communications:**

The speed measuring reader board was placed at the following locations and for the following amount of time in May 2006:

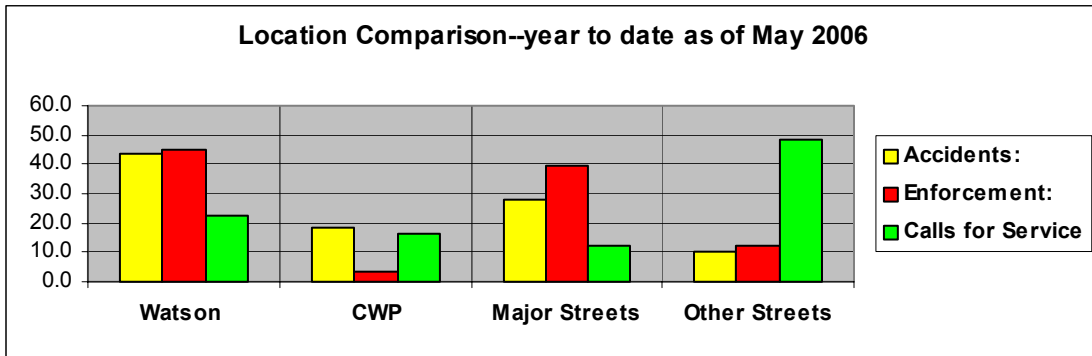


**Location Comparison:**
